RE: Hendon School mobile phone policy

Dear Parent/Carer,

Whilst we at Hendon understand that mobile phones are a part of modern life, we also recognise that in a school environment, they can cause disruption to learning and present safeguarding risks. In recent months, there has been an increase in students using their mobile phones at school and we would like to take this opportunity to remind students and families that Hendon is a phone free zone.

Student mobile phones are not permitted on site unless they are turned off and in the student's bag (at student's own risk). The same is true for airpods/headphones. If phones are on show, they are confiscated until the end of the day and students issued with a 30-minute detention after school.

Sixth formers may only use their phones in sixth form study centre and the library computer room.

To ensure this policy is consistently implemented and to provide clarity for students, the rules will now apply **at any time** on site (including before mentoring begins at 8:40 and after lessons end). Students will be able to collect confiscated items **from the detention hall** at the end of the school day.

We are aware that there are times when you may need to contact your child quickly. In these instances, please do call the school reception and we will facilitate this. Equally, if a child needs to contact home they should speak to the team in Student Support or their Head of Year who can support them with this.
