Vocational Level 2 Transition Year (1 year)

For students who do not reach the criteria to progress straight onto our level 3 courses, we offer a transition option. To access these courses students **must** have **5 GCSEs or equivalents at grade 2 or above**. Students will resit their English and/or maths GCSE, as required, and study up to three level 2 courses. The exact course options will be confirmed next year but they will be similar to those listed below. The courses run for one school year, after which point students will be able to apply for level 3 courses, provided they have achieved the entry criteria.

Two units over two years with an external exam and a personal development essay in year 13.

- Year 12 students will work on an 'Objects' theme working in a variety of different mediums exploring diverse ways of expressing their skills and creativity.
- In preparation for the mock exam Students will also complete a self-directed mini project on the theme of 'Breakfast' given them the opportunity to realise an outcome in the style and materials of their choice
- Year 13 is a self-written project that will consolidate all the skills. Techniques, and ideas that they formulated over the course of year 12.
- They will also complete a 1500+ essay for a personal study linked to the artist, art movement that is informing their current coursework.
- The students will complete an extended period of research and development for their exam preparation on a theme set by the exam board.







WHAT WILL I STUDY?



You will develop an understanding of economic concepts and theories through consideration of current economic issues, problems and institutions that affect everyday life. You will learn how to apply economic concepts and theories in a range of contexts and to appreciate their value and limitations in explaining real-world phenomena. You will also be taught how to analyse, explain and evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of the market economy, the role of government within it and how to participate effectively in society as a citizen, producer and consumer. Economics is much more than pounds and dollars; it's a fascinating study of psychology, of why people make certain decisions, and how resources are spread out around the world. Economics is studied in two main strands:

Microeconomics is the study of how individual parties (people, groups, and businesses) use their wealth.

Macroeconomics looks at entire economies. The unemployment, inflation, and monetary challenges of cities, countries, and continents.






This section involves an in-depth investigation into the beginnings of the British Empire, the reasons for its expansion, the effects on the indigenous people and how it eventually contracted to its status today.

1. 2R Cold War

This section involves research regarding international relations during an era of tension between communist and capitalist powers which threatened nuclear Armageddon. It explores concepts such as communism, military technology and promoting peace in the modern world.

This research project encourages students to study topics outside of the first two sections. Topics previously selected include the Ottoman Empire, the Tang Dynasty, the Rise of Sparta and the American Civil War.





- Unit 3 Live Performance Workshop. Students must learn how to create an original piece of group choreography, lasting 10 mins using an externally set task based on a stimulus/ topic. This can contain solo, duets, trios within the group performance. To translate their dance ideas into choreography, students must develop and apply practical knowledge and understanding of choreographic processes, including researching, developing and experimenting with dance ideas through studio and non-studio investigation, the rehearsal process and performance.
- Unit 10 Jazz Dance- Developing skills and techniques for an in-depth study of technique, practitioners and performance. You will develop your technique in a variety of dance styles and create a piece of choreography in your chosen dance style which demonstrates the physical demands of the style. You will have written coursework to complete as well as a presentation task and practical assessment.


