Nowrooz Egg-Painting



Roughly 40 wonderful students turned up to celebrate Nowrooz, New Year, on Tuesday 18th March. This date is marked by the Spring Equinox, initiating the New Year across several countries such as: Iran, Afghanistan, Uzbekistan. Tajikistan, Kazakhstan,



Turkmenistan, Kyrgyzstan, Azerbaijan, Armenia; for Parsi people across Pakistan and India, and Kurdish people

across Iraq, Syria and Turkey. This ancient festival dates back to 550BC, under Zoroastrian traditions of the Achaemenid Empire. It has morphed and spread in many ways, with Kurdish traditions attributing the festival to the triumph over a tyrant by a blacksmith named 'Kawa'. There are many other myths and folkloric tales following this celebration, making it a perfect intergenerational tradition and event.



We gathered to paint eggs together, a tradition most observed in Iran, whereby eggs symbolise fertility and new beginnings and are displayed on the 'Haft-Sin' table spread. Ms. Yazdi kindly explained this as including seven items beginning with the letter 'S', which have deep, symbolic meaning.

Students had a great time painting their eggs with their flags, favourite colours, a pomegranate design and various other

patterns. They bonded over sharing paint and paintbrushes, finding moments of similarity and difference in tastes when negotiating song choices (Gol Pari is always a winner) and using a school tie as 'Ser Chopi' for Kurdish dancing. A group of Year 10 ladies looked after boiling the eggs, after Mrs Stolk from Admin team kindly ran to Tesco to buy more (we did not expect such a brilliant turnout). Two Year 10 students later made tea and served it to their peers. Rituals of care, consideration and hospitality found their way into this new year. Thank you to everyone, staff and students, who came to paint eggs to initiate this celebration, it will remain a fond memory for years to come!

Alumni Dr Ian Ellis visits for National Science Week



Back in the classroom we drew bar charts, analysed the data, concluded and evaluated our results. For many students this was the first taster of conducting research; it was exciting to watch the students unravel their findings in the classroom.

communication skills, while enjoying food and drink.






