

Course Outline:

GCSE geography will continue to develop your curiosity and fascination about the world and its people. Studying geography to GCSE will improve knowledge about diverse places; people; resources; and natural and human environments; as well as an understanding the planet Earth's interconnected physical and human processes. The new GCSE geography course offers 21st century geographical issues, which will enable you to explore the world, the issues it faces and your own place in it. The specification encourages you to develop skills such as problem solving, decision making, fieldwork, plus helping you apply your knowledge from mathematics and statistics. There are three exam papers (details below), controlled assessment has been removed, but there are still compulsory fieldwork tasks for both physical and human investigations. The fieldwork will involve day trips to the Dorset coastline, central London. There is also potential for an optional, enrichment residential trip to Swanage.

Post 16 Progression:

GCSE Geography feeds directly into A-level Geography, as well as providing a good base of knowledge for more specialised science subjects at A-level. Geography is a broad academic subject which is regarded as a *"facilitating subject"* by universities. Geography provides a genuine balance between the traditional arts, sociology and sciences. Geographers are recognised by employers for having a range of transferable skills such as numeracy, literacy, team work, analytical thinking and are socially and environmentally aware of the world. Other paths of progression include into Travel and Tourism and other Humanities subjects.

Geographers enter a wide range of career areas from transport, environmental science and management, international development, disaster management, public services and education, business and finance, media and politics, settlement and urban planning.

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
